-Plagiarism-

- To steal or pass off as one's own
- To use without crediting the source
- To commit literary theft
- To present as new and original an idea or a product derived from an existing source

Ex:

- using/turning in someone's work as yours
- Duplicating thoughts, ideas, and words from others without their acknowledgement
- Failing to put quotations where they are needed
- Giving inaccurate information about the source of a quotation
- Changing words, but copying the sentence structure of a source without giving credit
- Copying many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your work, whether you give credit or not

What is copyright

The dictionary defines copyright as "a person's exclusive right to reproduce, publish, or sell his or her work of authorship."

What does copyright let you do?

- The right to claim authorship of the work.
- The right to object to any distortion, mutilation, or modification of the work.
- The right to object to any derogatory action that may damage the author's honor or fame.

-Citation-

- Information about the author
- Title of the work
- Name and location of the company that published your copy of the source
- The page numbers of the material you are borrowing

Why should I cite source?

- Extremely helpful to your peers
- Not all sources are right- proper citation keeps you from taking a bad rap for someone else's bad ideas

- Citing sources shows amount of research you have done.
- Citing sources strengthens your work by outside support.

When do I need to cite?

- Whenever you use quotes
- Whenever you paraphrase
- Whenever you use someone's idea that has already been indicated
- Whenever you use specific reference to the work of another.
- Whenever someone else's work has been critical in developing your own ideas.
